Pallative care: starting a new journal

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It is with great joy that I announce the birth of the Latin American Journal of Palliative Care (LAPC Journal), an initiative of the National Academy of Palliative Care (ANCP) from Brazil, supported by the Latin American Association for Palliative Care (ALCP). Its mission is to disseminate the results of scientific studies focused on clinical practice and research in palliative care, providing a theoretical background to be extremely useful for all professionals and specialists working in the area, not only communicating advances, but also impacting on improving the quality of life of patients and their families.

Despite the evident changes in Latin American scenario, with progress in several indicators¹, the region still shows many deficiencies and there is a wide path for growth in the area of palliative care, especially in health professional education. There is, in our countries, an irrefutable lack of journals dedicated to the publication of articles in this specialty, hence the innovative attitude of ANCP in creating this journal.

Figure 1 shows the global distribution of journals with the term "Palliative Care" in the title, registered on ISSN Portal (https://portal.issn.org/). There is a total of 108 journals, representing 17 countries. To date, we have found no record of a journal from Latin American countries specific to the area of palliative care.

Within this context we present an open access journal, with peer-reviewed articles and an Editorial Board comprised of palliative care professionals of renowned and recognized reputation, ensuring that the submitted manuscripts are published with the utmost quality.
